

Malcolm McClellan Campbell

Malcolm was born on April 9, 1891 to Flora and Malcolm Campbell, who had 8 other children. He lived on Concord Street in South St. Paul and worked as a cattle salesman until June 1917 when he registered for the Draft and was later enlisted into service when he was 26 years old.

Malcolm served in the National Guard, first as Private in Field Hospital (Medical) Co. 1, and was trained for three months at St. Paul Armory. He served at Camp Cody-Deming, New Mexico, and was reassigned to Field Hosp #135, 109th Sanitary Train, 35th Div. In March of 1918 he was promoted to Private 1st Class. Finally, he went to Camp Dixon in New Jersey before shipping out on the *Baltic* in October of 1918 to Liverpool, where he was stationed for several days before moving to France. He did not participate in any battles but was stationed throughout France at Rosny, La Havre, Le Mans, Revigny, Bar-sur-Aube, Recey sur-Ource, and Barisey-la-Cote. In July of 1919 Malcolm shipped back to the U.S. at Hoboken, and was mustered out of service later that month in Des Moines, Iowa.

After the war Malcolm returned to St. Paul where he resided and continued to work as a cattle broker. He never married. Malcolm died on November 13, 1943 at the VA Hospital in St. Cloud, and is buried with his parents and three of his siblings in Minto Cemetery in Walsh, North Dakota.
